- 1) ARTS 101 or 102 or ARTH 275, 276, 278, or 302 may be used to meet the Artistic Approaches core (Honors students may take HON 206 as a substitute for ARTH 275).
- 2) At least two of the 300-level art history electives (list of possible elective courses included on page 2) need to be taken at Puget Sound and be completed by the end of the junior year.
- 3) Review of a substantial art history research paper before end of the junior year.
- 4) Of the three units of upper-division coursework required outside the first major, the Connections course will count for one unless it is used to meet a major requirement.

*Prerequisites include ARTH 294, two additional ARTH courses, and the completion of at least one substantial research paper (at least 10 pages and approved by art history faculty) in art history.

Elective units are available in art and art-related fields, which provide concentration, depth, and choices for the art major in painting, drawing, printmaking, history, and sculpture.

NOTES

Students majoring in Art History must earn a GPA of 2.0 in courses taken for the major and all courses taken for a major must be taken for graded credit.

*HON 206 may only be taken by Honors students as a replacement for ARTH 275.

#Four of the following art history electives: ARTH 278, 302, 325, 334, 359-363, 365, 367-371, 380, 399; HUM 330; LAS 387.

##At least two 300-level art history courses must be taken at the University of Puget Sound and be completed by the end of the junior year.

**Art History majors are required to submit by the end of their junior year a copy of a graded substantial art history research paper (at least 10 pages in length) for mid-level evaluation.

Students who satisfy the university foreign language requirement with a proficiency exam (3rd high school level or 1st year college level) or AP foreign language score of 4 or 5, or IB higher level foreign language score of 5, 6, or 7 are required to take a departmental translation exam.
