



Asian/Pacific Islander Scholarship 2022-23 Academic Year

Submit completed applications to Student Financial Services (Jones 019) by March 31, 2022

The Asian/Pacific* Islander Scholarship was created in 2017 by members of the Asian/Pacific Islander Collective and the Asian Student Community in order to alleviate financial barriers to higher education for A/PI students. The Asian/Pacific Islander Scholarship was especially designed to be mindful of students who are low-income, first-generation American, first-generation college students, native/indigenous to the islands of Micronesia, Melanesia, or Polynesia, undocumented, disabled, and/or facing other significant barriers to the cost of a Puget Sound education. The scholarship gives preference to students who self-identify as Asian or Pacific Islander, are in fair academic standing, and demonstrate leadership or community involvement.

All students who identify as Asian/Pacific Islander are eligible for this scholarship even if they do not hold the aforementioned intersections of identities. The founding scholarship members wish to acknowledge multiracial, multiethnic, and adopted students who may feel that they do not “belong” to either label of ‘Asian’ or ‘Pacific Islander.’ Multiracial, multiethnic, and adopted students of Asian descent all qualify for this scholarship. While the exact scholarship amount has yet to be determined, in the past we have awarded 2-4 scholarships with amounts ranging from \$800 to \$1,500 per student.

***Asian” often becomes associated solely with those who are East Asian because of the racial flattening of people from the entire continent of Asia. We wish to ensure that all those who are from, descend from, or who have heritage in Central, South, Southeast, and Western regions of Asia know that this scholarship and its committee is intentional about ensuring those who are thought of as marginal within the “Asian” umbrella have access to this fund. We also recognize that the history of ethnic groups in Asia have often been mixed, traumatic, or nomadic and that many people are unaware of what specific countries their family might be connected to.*

**Pacific Islander is also a broad umbrella term but we wish to name that students with ethnic heritage or descend from the islands within Micronesia, Melanesia, and Polynesia, and those with indigenous heritage to New Zealand and Australia face particularly harsh barriers to education and therefore ought to be centered in the distribution of funds from this scholarship.*
