



#### From the Interim Chair



## **Welcome Incoming Cohort**





This collaborative research has been accepted for presentation at the 2026 World Federation of Occupational Therapy (WFOT) Congress in Bangkok, Thailand.

Greetings fellow OTs,

I was excited to read your latest summer newsletter. While I could not attend in person, I was there in spirit. This caught my eye: Send us details about where you have taken your OT degree: Email us about your OT journey and we will add your pin(s) to the map. I am a 1985 graduate from the UPS school of OT. I am now retired, but my 35-year OT career has taken me to Bulgaria where I volunteered as a pediatric OT in the handicapped orphanages, primarily in the small town of Lukovit. This was in 1992. My main responsibilities were to get to know the kids, set up any sort of therapy programs, and liaison with Adoption Advocates International (based in Port Angeles, WA) to try get kids adopted into the United States.

I also worked in St. Louis, MO. One of my jobs was at Irene Walter Johnson Institute, which is linked to the OT school there, so we were tagged to guest lecture at the OT school. I was doing a rotation in kidney and liver transplants at that time so that is what I guest lectured on. This was 1987-90.

I also worked in the public schools in Portland Oregon, Seattle WA, and Honolulu Hawaii, but you probably already have pins in those areas.

I forgot to mention that I was a traveling therapist for a while, dual licensed in WA and OR and living in Portland, so my employer, Professional Therapists On Call, sent me all over. Some cities I recall: Longview, Chehalis, Centralia, Hood River, Roseburg.
