Its text speaks of finding consolation even when we feel unsteady or alone, because we still have the moon — and the hope it symbolizes.

As we offer this concert to you, we hope it brings a bit of warmth to these long December nights and reminds you that light is still growing among us. Thank you for being part of our community this semester. *Hope lingers on.*

BIOGRAPHIES

ERIN GUINUP is a conductor, composer, and arts consultant whose work bridges cultures and builds community. She is the founding Executive and Artistic Director of the Tacoma Refugee Choir, where she led singers from more than 75 countries in performances for over 50,000 people, including appearances at TEDxSeattle and national conferences for ACDA and Welcoming America.

Her teaching career includes guiding voice students to Broadway and operatic stages and directing choirs and orchestras in major works such as Handel's *Messiah* and Rob Gardner's *Lamb of God.* As a performer, she has sung in more than twenty languages across three continents, appeared as soprano soloist with Symphony Tacoma, starred in *Mary Poppins*, and toured internationally with her one-woman show honoring female musical-theatre composers. Her compositions have been performed by the U.S. Air Force Band and Rainbow City Orchestra, and featured on PBS.

Guinup's accolades include Chorus America's Louis Botto Award for Innovation and Entrepreneurship, the American Academy of Teachers of Singing Award for Inclusion and Inspiration, and 253 Lifestyle Magazine's Person of the Year. She holds an MBA in Arts Innovation and bachelor's degrees in vocal performance and music education from the University of Puget Sound.

JIEUN YUN, D.M.A., is an accomplished organist, pianist, and collaborative artist active throughout the Tacoma and Seattle areas. She currently serves as an affiliate pianist at the University of Puget Sound School of Music and works as the collaborative pianist for the Bremerton Symphony Chorale. Yun also conducts the Tacoma First Baptist Church Choir and frequently collaborates with churches, choirs, vocalists, instrumentalists, and ensembles across the region.

Yun holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ performance, studying under Dr. Carol Britt. Her scholarly interests include Baroque chorale-based repertoire and the liturgical and stylistic practices of J. S. Bach. She has also pursued advanced training through master classes with distinguished artists such as Dr. Faythe Freese, Dr. Kola Owalabi, and others.

In addition to her collaborative and teaching work, Yun performs regularly as a soloist, including recent recitals at Christ Episcopal Church in Tacoma. Earlier in her career, she received a full scholarship in instrumental music and served as the head collaborative pianist for a university music division. Passionate about musical excellence and community engagement, she

brings energy, artistry, and dedication to her work as a performer, educator, and collaborator.

THE KAMANAS is a rising family gospel ensemble whose sound is inspired by the sacred musical traditions of Africa. Composed of three siblings; Providence Kamana, Dorcas Kamana, Bienvenu Kamana and their sister-in-law, Daisy Mwangi Kamana, the group is known for its rich vocal blend, dynamic arrangements, and anointing-filled performances.

The Kamanas have shared their music at churches, multicultural festivals, worship gatherings, and community events throughout the Congo and the Northwest, earning recognition for their warm stage presence and powerful storytelling. Their members have collaborated with renowned choirs, composers, and worship leaders, contributing to a growing footprint in the regional gospel scene. With a mission to uplift and unify, The Kamanas bring a refreshing, globally rooted expression of gospel music that continues to inspire audiences of all backgrounds.

VICTORIA WOODARDS serves as the Mayor of Tacoma, where she champions equity, community partnership, and opportunities for all residents to thrive. Throughout her tenure, she has focused on expanding affordable housing, supporting youth and families, strengthening public safety, and creating pathways to good jobs. Mayor Woodards has also been a lifelong lover of song and music. With over 40 years of experience as a Choir Director at Allen AME Church, she believes deeply in the power of music to unite and heal the world around us.
