PERFORMER

Eunmin Woo '19, student of Dr. Maria Sampen, is majoring in violin performance at the University of Puget Sound. She attended Interlochen Arts Academy from 2010-2012 as a music major and the Indiana University's Jacobs School of Music summer string program, where she studied with Erin Aldridge. In addition to her classes and solo work, Woo has served the exciting job of concertmaster of the Puget Sound Symphony since 2016. She has won competitions as first place in Philadelphia and in Washington state (including the All-State orchestra and the regional Solo and Ensemble competition) and has played for numerous masterclasses, including classes with Brian Lewis; Paul Kantor; and Bill Preucil. Woo also has studied with the former concertmaster of the Seattle Symphony, Maria Larionoff, the former concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic, Glenn Dicterow, and members of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Aside from her studies, she maintains a studio of private violin students in Olympia. In 2017, Woo was awarded the Ed Seferian endowed scholarship by the University of Puget Sound music faculty. She is very grateful for all the wonderful opportunities, mentors, and friends here at University of Puget Sound.

ACCOMPANIST

Chorong Park completed her doctoral degree in Collaborative Piano at the University of Texas at Austin with Anne Epperson in 2016. She holds an Artist Diploma from the Cleveland Institute of Music (2011), and a M.M (2009) in Collaborative Piano from the Eastman School of Music. She has been a staff pianist at the Meadowmount School of Music since 2015. During her career, she was a staff pianist at the Aspen Music Festival and School (2011) and the AIMS program in Graz, Austria (2014). Before pursuing her D.M.A, she completed fellowships in collaborative piano at the Aspen Music Festival and School (2010), Music Academy of the West (2012, 2013), and Bard College Conservatory of Music (2011-2013).
