## DIRECTOR

**DAVID DEACON-JOYNER** is professor and director of jazz studies at PLU. He is a native of Memphis, Tenn.. Deacon-Joyner came to western Washington from University of North Texas in Denton, where he held the position of associate professor of jazz studies from 1986 to 2000. He received his bachelor's degree in composition and Ph.D. in ethnomusicology from University of Memphis, and his master's degree in composition from University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He was the lead instructor for the Great Basin Jazz Camp from 2008–2012, and is a member of the steering committee for The Seattle Jazz Experience. A scholar in jazz and popular music, he has written numerous published articles and books, including a chapter for *The Cambridge History of American Music* and the third edition of his history text *American Popular Music*. He has performed with jazz artists such as Bobby Shew, Marvin Stamm, Marc Johnson, Ed Soph, and others. Deacon-Joyner is a professional vocalist in both studio and live settings, and is a composer and arranger. He arranged big band charts for Jeff Coffin, saxophonist with Bela Fleck and the Flecktones, and the Jeff Coffin Mu'tet.

He continues to perform and teach extensively throughout the Northwest and across the country.
