PROGRAM NOTE

In Memoriam A.L.R. (1997) Lawrence Ebert

"Lawrence Ebert (1932–2000) was professor of composition and theory at University of Puget Sound. He wrote numerous works for various instrumental compositions. In 1987, when I joined the Puget Sound faculty, we became good friends, and I was privileged to receive many new works from Lawrence, composed for me. The first was his Suite for 2 Violas, (1987), later a concerto for viola and strings, several mixed chamber works and a unique concerto for viola and ten wind instruments. Since many of these works were premiered at my Max Aronoff Viola Institute. Lawrence was a beloved colleague within that group. He served on the MAVI Board of Directors, where he became friends with my father, Allan L. Ramée. From 1994 to 1997, Allan's progressive illness from dementia was an ever-present part of my life. The support of friends, including Lawrence, was a sustaining force for me. When Father passed in 1997, Lawrence composed In Memoriam, A.L.R. as his gift to me. I premiered the work at the 1997 MAVI Festival. Audience reception of it was immediate and favorable, and Lawrence eventually asked me to offer it at his own memorial service, which I did in 2000. I have performed the piece in several contexts over the years and it continues to shine as one of Lawrence's most beautiful and accessible works. It is a joy and honor to have a gifted student learn and present the piece today. My thanks and best wishes to Forrest."
